Drug charges filed against psychologist

A Miami-Dade psychologist charged with manslaughter after his one-time patient died of a pain killer overdose has been arrested on separate drug charges, prosecutors said Monday.

Adam Feder, 40, was released on bond from a Miami-Dade jail on Sunday.

Feder was originally arrested in February for the 2006 death of aspiring model Rachel Finzi, 20, a patient who became his girlfriend.

Miami-Dade police and prosecutors say Feder had broken off their romance but gave the distraught woman more than 100 times the safe dosage of the painkiller oxycodone.

At the time, Feder was also charged with trafficking in oxycodone and seven counts of fraudulently obtaining a controlled substance.

Prosecutors say he used other doctors' prescription pads to illegally obtain oxycodone. Feder is a clinical psychologist -- he cannot prescribe medication -- who specialized in treating substance abusers.

The new charges stem from a search of his apartment conducted by Miami-Dade detectives when he was arrested in February.

Detectives found more drugs, according to an arrest warrant released Monday. An analysis by Miami-Dade's crime lab showed the drugs were cocaine, marijuana, oxycodone and amphetamines, prosecutors say.

He was charged with a slew of drug possession counts, including trafficking in illegal drugs for the oxycodone.

"We will be entering a plea of not guilty and reviewing all the documentation," said Feder's defense attorney, Brian Tannebaum.

The Finzi family has since sued Feder and Compass Health Systems, where Feder met Finzi in 2004.
