Dear Dr. Chowdhury:

The North Carolina Medical Board ("Board") has reviewed information regarding the professional liability payment made on your behalf on November 25, 2009. It is this Board's decision not to commence formal proceedings against your license to practice medicine at this time. However, the Board did vote to issue you this public letter of concern.

From January 3, 2005 until January 25, 2006, you treated Patient A for several psychiatric conditions, including Post Traumatic Stress Disorder ("PTSD"), anxiety, depression, not sleeping, and suicidal ideation. You later diagnosed Patient A as being bipolar. You prescribed various medications for Patient A, but the strength and frequency of dosage were not properly documented in your records. You were out of the country and unavailable to Patient A for an extended period of time without referring Patient A to another physician. The patient was seen by a therapist from your group in your absence. While the patient had been advised that your group had psychiatrists available 24 hours a day in the Emergency Room, your offer to refer Patient A to another member of your group while you were away was not adequately documented in your chart. At the time of your departure, you should have suspected Patient A may have been unstable and at risk for suicide. Ultimately, Patient A did commit suicide during your absence.

As part of this public letter of concern, the Board orders you to make contact with the Board's Office of Medical Director within thirty (30) days of this letter to arrange a plan where you complete ten (10) hours of Continuing Medical Education ("CME") in the following topics: medical record-keeping and prescribing for depression, bipolar disorder and PTSD. The CME courses must be approved by the Board's Office of Medical Director and completed within twelve (12) months of this letter. Failure to complete the required CME will result in the Board initiating public disciplinary proceedings pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §90-14(a)(6) based on your care of Patient A.

Also, the Board cautions you that any repetition of practices that form the basis of this letter may lead to the commencement of formal disciplinary proceedings against your license to practice medicine, wherein this public letter of concern may be entered into evidence as aggravation.
